


## Annual Astronomy Day to feature observation of planet alignment

The annual Astronomy Day is being celebrated this Saturday at the observatories at Penn State Behrend. Astronomy Day is always held on the second to last Saturday in April, but Behrend doesn't always take part.


This year's Astronomy Day will begin shortly after sunset at 8:30 .p.,m. and will last until approximately 10:30 p.m. The time may vary due to the weather and the number of visitors who attend. Everyone from the age of one to 104 is invited.

As long as the weather permits and the clouds are thin or it is clear, the event will go on as planned. If it is partly cloudy, the brighter objects like the moon, Jupiter, and Saturn will pop in and out of the clouds, but will still be observable. However, if the clouds are too thick, even the really blazing objects will

Both of Behrend's observatories will be open this Saturday for observers to look at the solar system. The smaller observatory contains a Meade twelve-inch Schmidt-Cassegrain telescope. Basically, the telescope is a twelve-inch refracting telescope. The Mehalso Observatory is larger than the other one, and contains an 18-cm Meade

refractor equipped with computer controls and a CCD Camera. The Mehalso Observatory and its seveninch refracting telescope were a gift from Behrend alumni Dr. Robert Mehalso and his wife, Elizabeth, in
