The Behrend Lady Lions finished out 1-1 in another rocky week as the team continues play in the second half of the season. After defeating conference rival Pitt-Greensburg Saturday, the team lost to Case Western Reserve in a 6-0 route on Wednesday. The pressure continues to mount with only a few weeks left in the regular season.

On Wednesday, Oct. 8, Behrend traveled to Cleveland to take on Case Western in a non-conference match. The Lady Lions suffered a 6-0 loss, their worst of the season, as a talented CWR moved to 8-1-2. Alicia Bardierri and Laura Stokes each had two goals for Case Western. Behrend's record dropped to 8-3.

"We didn't get off to a good start," said Coach Dan Perritano.

"We're more physical, our forward's are finishing, and we're more together," said Baker.

The win over the Bobcats put the Lady Lions at 3-0 in AMCC play, where Baker says the team still has its eye on preseason favorite Frostburg State.

Perritano said, "Beating Frostburg is still our goal, but we have a ways to go before then." The Lady Lions will not see action against Frostburg State until the last game of the regular season.

After the up and down week, Perritano said his team will bounce back positively from Wednesday's loss. The Lady Lions will travel to West Virginia to take on Bethany this weekend. The Lady Bison team is struggling this year, currently standing at 0-7-1.

Behrend women's soccer will return home next Monday and Thursday to take on Grove City and Allegheny respectively.

The Men's Soccer team defeated Pitt-Greensburg on Saturday October 4th by a score of 3-1 to take sole possession of first place in the Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference.

Behrend improved to 6-2-2 with an undefeated 3-0 conference record. The Panthers dropped to 8-2-1 with a 2-1 conference record. Both teams have three conference matches left before the start of the AMCC tournament on Nov. 5.

Nyberg scored the first goal of the game, unassisted, at the 21 minute mark of the first half. Thirteen minutes later, sophomore defenseman Brian Blaszczyk netted the eventual game winning goal and increased Behrend's lead to 2-0. The goal was



Shortstop Alex Gonzalez is tied for the most home runs in the playoffs with four.


If the Cubs advance to the World Series, it will be their first appearance since losing in 1945.

Closer Scott Williamson is leading all AL pitchers in wins (two) and ERA (0.00). He also leads in saves with two.




- The Florida Marlins, led by catcher Ivan Rodriguez, defeated the favored San Francisco Giants in four games in their Division Series.
