man Board. This system has been developed by the Collegian to help better the future years of the campus newspaper.

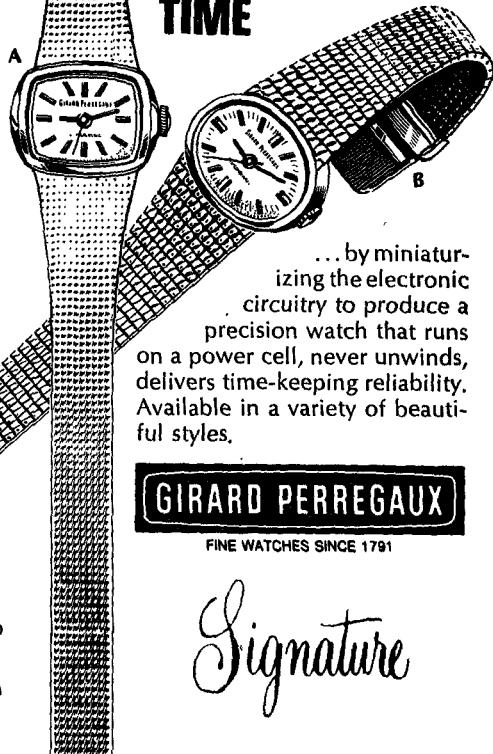
