When he's home for the week-ends, life is not as it used to be in the days before college. No telephones are ringing for him, no mail is waiting at the post office in his name, for the majority of his friends have gone their separate ways. And the dorm could hardly be considered home, for in two or four years he will graduate and start a new, if just as temporary, life for himself.

In conclusion, then, a student must first recognize all of the conflicts and differences which face him before he can totally adapt to his new college surroundings. He must also realize that once he leaves home, he can never go back again.
