The format of the meet will include compulsory exercises in Thursday afternoon and evening sessions. Friday and Saturday nights will be reserved for optional exercise competition.

The U.S. and Soviet teams will be selected by the gymnastics federations of each country. Both nations are expected to go with their best gymnasts in preparation for the Olympics.

U.S. gymnastic officials indicate that the American teams must make a strong showing against the Soviets to be assured of one of the 12 team berths at Montreal. The Soviet women qualified by placing first in the World Games in Varna, Bulgaria, in 1974. The Soviet men earned a team berth with a second place showing in the same meet.

Series tickets, good for all four sessions of the meet, are priced at \$12 each. Only series tickets will be sold over the counter on Dec. 7. Mail orders and orders for individual sessions may be accepted at a later date if any tickets remain after the counter sale.
