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Work abroad

NEW YORK(CIEE) -- Now students who want to work in Great Britain, France, Germany or Ireland don't have to worry about all the red tape usually involved in finding a job abroad. CIEE (Council on International Educational Exchange), the largest non-profit student travel organization in the U.S., will make all the arrangements so that students can work in any of these four countries.

Participants in CIEE's "Work in Britain" program get official permission to find a job anywhere in the British Isles for up to six months at any time of the year. Last year students or 236 North Santa Cruz, #314, on the program did everything from serving ale in a pub in a Yorkshire village to typing scripts in a London television studio.

In Ireland, Germany and France students work at summer jobs - usually in stores, hotels, restaurants or factories.

The program in Germany is free and includes a job placement by the ZAV (the German national employment service). For the program in Ireland, the fee is \$10; in Great Britain. \$25; in France, \$25, or \$85 if a job is prearranged by the Paris office of CIEE.

All past participants agree: there's no better way to get to know a country than to work and live there. With CIEE's work program, that's easy to do.
