Industries And Employees Buy \$600,072.75 During Bond Drive

Employes of Centre County industries and the industries them-selves achieved a most commendable record during the Sixth War Loan Campaign in December, a survey yesterday revealed

Workers in industry during the campaign purchased a total of \$207,547.75 in bonds, and the industries purchased an additional total of \$392,525.00, making a grand total of \$600,072.75—or a substantial portion of the entire county quota of \$1,950,000 for the drive. The industrial figures are exclusive of those from the Philipsburg area which were not available yesterday.
