The average club or organization will grab almost any excuse for a supper.

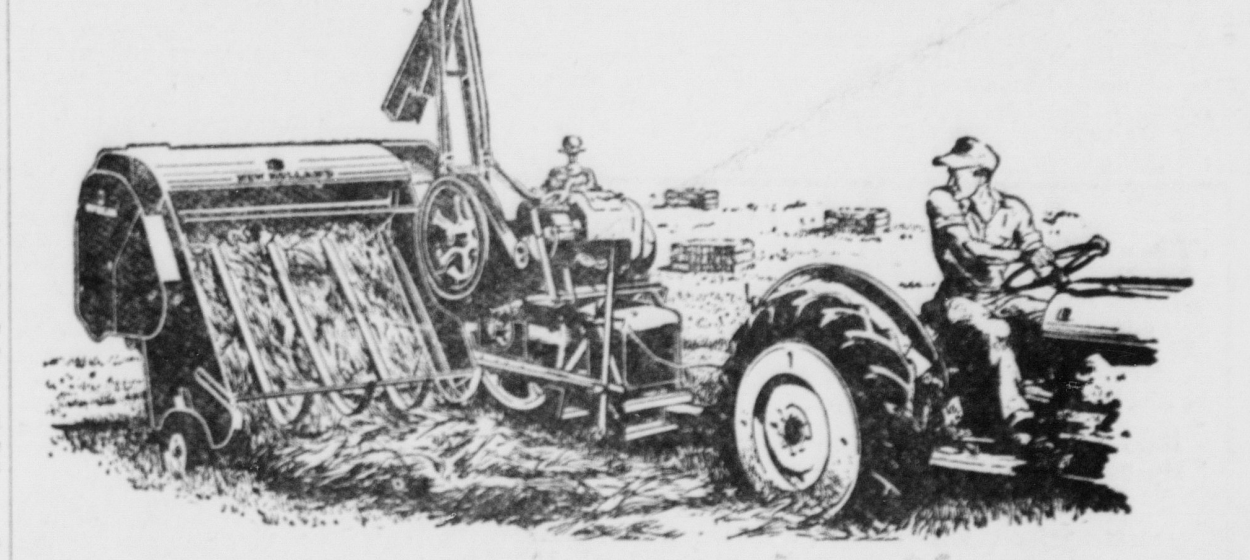
