Maj. Wm. Wiley, Jr. Serves In Germany

Major William S. Wiley, Jr. of State College, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Wiley, 307 Forster Court apartments, State College, is a member of Headquarters 7th Army at Stuttgart, Germany, in charge of the Operations Branch of the Army Chemical Section. He was reassigned to Army from the Bremerhaven Port of Embarkation where he was post chemical officer.

A graduate of State College high school and Penn State, class of 1941, Major Wiley received his ORC commission May, 1940 at Penn State. In addition to his Chemical Corps service training he is a graduate of the Advanced Infantry Course at Ft. Benning Ga.

He fought in Europe with the 93d Chemical Mortar Battalion as a company commander; returned to the States in 1945 to serve as assistant chemical officer of Hq. 1st Army in New York, and returned to Germany in 1950 with his family to become administration officer of the Chemical Division of the European Command Headquarters. He was brought to Army Headquarters this month.
