Grade Crossings Are Scenes Of Accidents

Accidents on railroad grade crossings still are taking an annual death toll throughout the nation despite modern warning equipment and in the great majority of cases the motorists are to blame, declares Edward P. Curran, Safety Director of

Keystone Automobile Club.
"Many of these tragic accidents happen," he went on, "because the drivers are not aware of the danger of driving across the tracks while red signals still are flashing after a train has passed.

"Normally, this type of signal stops flashing as soon as the last car in a train has cleared the crossing. However, if it continues to flash after a train has passed it is a certain sign that another train is approaching.

"Another factor in grade crossing accidents not appreciated by many motorists is the brevity of warning given by such signals. There is an interval of only about 20 seconds between the beginning of the flash and the appearance of the fastest trains at crossings. In the case of slow trains, the interval may be as long as a minute, but in any event the delay is not sufficient for any motorist to take chances.

"The only safe rule is never to cross a railroad while the signal is

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
