PERPETUAL PASTE.—A perpetual paste may be made by dissolving an ounce of alum in a quart of warm water. When cold add as much flour as will make it the consistency of cream; then stew into it half a teaspoonful of powdered resin, and two or three cloves. Boil it to a consistency, stirring all the time. It will keep for twelve months, and when dry may be moistened with water.

At a rock blasting on the Lebanon Springs Railroad, in the town of South Petersburg, Rensselaer county, N. Y., on Saturday morning, Jan. 50, three men named John Conner and E. B. Webster, of Syracuse, and William Clayton were killed, and five others seriously wounded by the premature explosion of nitro-glycerine. Of the injured, John C. Neal cannot possibly survive. The killed were horribly mutilated, their limbs being blown off and their bodies rendered almost unrecognizable.

The San Francisco papers complain that the yield of wheat in California has fallen from forty bushels an acre down to twenty bushels; and that, if the present improvident style of farming continues, the crops will not average over twenty bushels an acre. The old custom of burning the stubble and straw, instead of turning it into compost, is objected to.

LAST Sunday the congregation of the Dutch Reformed Church, in Little Falls, N. 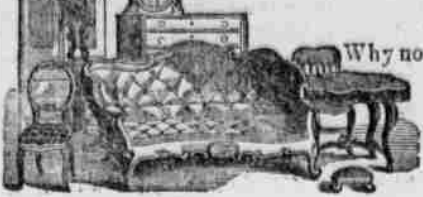
