FISHING WITH GUNPOWDER.—Yesterday we had a conversation with a gentleman who had some experience at this kind of fishing. Last week, he several times went out with parties of gentlemen to blast trout out of the Carson. The way they practice this new mode of fishing is as follows:

They take a cartridge of Giant powder weighing about a quarter of a pound, insert into it a piece of fuse, properly capped, about six inches in length, then lighting the fuse, the cartridge is thrown into any deep hole supposed to contain trout or other fish.

Immediately after the explosion, all the fish that happen to be within a circle of twenty-five or thirty feet of the spot where the cartridge fell, come to the surface, either killed outright, or so badly stunned that it is some minutes before they recover. Our informant says that with two cartridges he saw over fifty pounds of fish killed, counting trout, white-fish and chubs. This is the most destructive mode of fishing we have heard of—it is a regular wholesale slaughter of great and small, good and bad. Should the practice gain ground it will be necessary for the Legislature to put a stop to it by an act making it a criminal offence to fish with Giant powder.—Virginia City (Nevada) Enterprise.

MULE TRIFLERS.—Yesterday morning we noticed the theft of a pair of mules from North East the night before, and before the item was read the thief had been captured. On Monday evening Mr. Lyman T. Skinner, of North East, had been out of town with his team, and charitably gave a young fellow, a stranger to him, a ride in. They drove to the postoffice, where both got out and Mr. Skinner hitched his team. Shortly afterwards the young man deliberately un hitched them and drove off at a rapid rate. He was traced as far as the Fair Grounds just east of this city, where the trial was held, but again taken up, Mr. Lyman and Col. Amos Gould, of North East, having followed him, and himself and mules were found near Walnut Creek a few miles west of the city. He was brought to the city and yesterday morning had a hearing before Justice Griffith, where he gave his name as Edward McFarlan. In default of \$300 bail, the Justice committed him to jail to await trial at next term of Court.—Erie Daily Dispatch.

FRONTIER MURDER.—On Saturday night last, about 12 o'clock, a horrible murder was committed at Parker's Landing. It appears that a man named Alexander Fleming had seduced the sister of W. H. Greenwood, and Fleming had been repeatedly warned by the brother to keep away from the house. On Saturday night he was there again, when Greenwood with a ranch company drew a revolver and fired three times at Fleming, causing death in half an hour. Greenwood was arrested and brought before T. B. Faulk, Esq., Justice of the Peace, Kittanning, and by him committed to jail to await trial. The body of the murdered man reached Kittanning in a skill and has been buried.—Independent.
