SUICIDE.—About noon on Thursday, Justus Hess of McKean township committed suicide. He was a farmer, living near the line between McKean and Waterford township. He was about 76 years of age and has been an invalid, and confined to his bed, for over six months, during which time he has frequently said he had no business to live. At the time mentioned, he sent his wife to the spring for water. A loaded gun stood at the head of the bed, and with it he succeeded in shooting himself through the neck, killing him almost instantly.—Eric Dispatch.

THE French authorities complain that much valuable information has been given to the Prussian Generals by the cable telegrams sent to this country from France, and subsequently transmitted back to Berlin. Of all the uses to which Morse's great invention has been applied this is the most astonishing. The fact that arises in sight of each other should learn facts sufficiently important to affect their movements through the enterprise of newspapers published more than three thousand miles from the scene of action is one of the greatest marvels of these marvelous times.

WAR TOPICS.—Poor Napoleon is reduced, according to last accounts, to beggarly personal income of \$40,000 gold per annum.

The downfall of Louis Napoleon recalls the cutting repartee which he is said to have received from Lady Blessington. The Countess had befriended him when he was a poor adventurer in London, and went to Paris to be near him after he had become prosperous. Much to her chagrin, he paid her no attention, but one day when their carriages were abreast in a thronged street, Napoleon said, "Countess how long do you expect to remain in Paris?" She answered, with dignity and ominous wit, "Only a short time. How long do you expect to stay here?"

Touching and amusing hospital stories connected with the war begin to be current. For instance, a Prussian and a Frenchman find themselves opposing each other; both fire, and are wounded. Presently they find themselves in two adjoining beds of an ambulance. The Frenchman was a Lorraine, and spoke a little German. Of course talking soon commenced and in an hour or two they were fast friends, and began planning the most amicable arrangements for—"after the war." "Ah!" said the German, "if you knew what a fine grocery I have at Liedberg! If you do not promise to

come and spend a month with me when the campaign is over, I shall not believe in your friendship." "No, no," was the reply; "that cannot be until you have tasted the nice little Moselle wine that we make at home."—Dispatch.

It is reported that the ex-Emperor Louis Napoleon, recently purchased through his agents, an estate in Kent, England, and that he has invested in British and other solid securities about thirty millions of dollars, and has an annual income of about a million from his investments in English funds alone, with as much more from investments in other countries, the United States included.—With the sweet reflection that in his misfortune penury is not included, and that the wants of his stomach are to be appeased with the necessities and dainties of life prepared by the hands of the Queen of Prussia's own cook, Napoleon is in a tolerable good position after all. In his old age he retires from public life with a handsome competence to counteract the great cares which rested upon him when the Empire was Peace; and besides has a wife and child left to console him in his declining days. Not one-tenth of his age have been thus comfortably situated.—Erie.

FRAUD UPON FARMERS.—The Washington Reporter of last week says: We believe that a number of farmers throughout this country have been swindled by parties representing themselves as being from Iowa, and who claimed to have the disposal of an agency for a celebrated improved grain-drill. In many cases these scoundrels duped our citizens by pretending to sell them rights, etc., and exacting in exchange their signatures to papers, represented to be agreements, but really being promissory notes. Several farmers in Amwell, Franklin, Hopewell and other townships of the county have been completely defrauded. Some months since we first heard of this rascality, and warned the public then against the swindlers, but it seems to have been disregarded. Our farmers should be very chary about dealing with irresponsible agents.

STEAM ON COMMON ROADS.—The practicability of using steam on common roads appears at last to have been thoroughly tested in Scotland, where the success of Mr. R. W. Thompson's road steamers, after various trials, has earned for them the endorsement of the most skeptical. A six horse road steamer has been running for several months from Aberdeen, a distance of four miles, over a wretched road, to the Kiteok Flour Mills. In many parts of the road the grade is one in eight, over which the steam engine draws ten tons with a great ease at the rate of three miles and a half an hour. When we have canals navigated by steamboats, and locomotives run on common roads, 'trade and travel' will increase beyond expression.—Va. State Journal.
