One hundred and fifty thousand scres of the best timber is cut every year to supply the demand for railway repairs and cars the annual expendi- easily. tures in wood is thirty eight millions of dollars. In a single year the locomotives in the United States consume fitty-six millions of dollars' worth of wood .-There are, in the whole country, more than four hundred thousand artisans in wood; and if the value of the labor is one thousand dollars a year each, the wood industry of the country represents an amount of nearly five hundred millions of dollars per annum.
