A PROCLAMATION. WHEREAS: It behooves a people sensible of their dependence on the Almighty publicly and collectively, to acknowledge their gratitude for his

avors and humbly to beseech for their continuance, and WHEREAS; the people of the United States for the year now about to end, have a special cause for gratiude, for the abundance of our harvest and the absence of pestilence, foreign war and

civil strife, now. THEREFORE, Be it known that I, U. S. Grant, President of the United States, concurring in many similar recommendations from chief Magistrates of the United States do hereby recommend to all citizens to meet in their respective places of worship on Thursday, the 24th day of November next there to give thanks for the bounty of God, during the year about to close and to supplicate for its continuance here
