Have you ordered your "Yankee
Washing Machine?" If there is any
branch of domestic labor that is a drudge
and gives an unrest to an household, it
is washing and washing day; and if
there is any branch of mechanism that
has baffled the ingenuity and thus far
prevailed a failure, it is substituting any

machinery to take the place of hand la-
bor in this the most laborious of house-
hold duties; in fact, every garret is filled
with old washing machine trumpery—
useless from the very start—and people
have been led to believe from these fail-
ure that there is no other way only
hand labor, sowing one's self in a wash-
tub and rubbing the hide off every sin-
ger at each succeeding wash day. It
is really something strange that ingenuity
has not over come these difficulties and re-
lieved women in some measure from this
hardship. It has supplied mowing, reap-
ing, raking and pitching machines, for
farmers; it has, in place of the old, tedious
saw and its surroundings, substituted
the circular, handblocks, saw sets, scissars, &c., &c., all of which
facilitate labor, and are of great value,
but in this branch of household duties,
no improvements have been made since
Neah's wife washed her duds in the Ark
and dried them on deck.

The bill to provide a relief fund for
employees in the executive Department's
of the government was reported with
amendments by Mr. Sherman, from the
Finance Committee.

The bill was taken up, on motion of
Mr. Drake, and discussed for one hour
by Messrs. Conkling, Davis, Morton,
Drake, Tipton, Howe, and Howell.

The question turned upon the propriety
of levying compulsory contributions
upon government clerks to defray
funeral expenses of deceased associates,
and for other purposes. It was objected
that the proposed legislation could have
no binding efficacy, and was belittling
to the clerks.

Mr. Davis offered an amendment pro-
hibiting political assessments in all offic-
es.

Mr. Wilson submitted as a substitute
for an amendment to the bill previously
introduced by him, on the same subject.

Mr. Drake good humoredly indicated
a modification of Mr. Davis' amend-
ment to the effect that prohibition should
cense, as soon as the Democratic party
came into power. [Laughter.]

Mr. Saulsbury remarked that the
lesson taught the Senator from Missouri
in his own State, had doubtless opened
his eyes to the fact that the party, of
which he was so distinguished a member,
was about passing out of existence, to
make way for a great national party,
which, though temporarily defeated by
triumph and violence, was again about to
unfold its time-honored flag above a
reunited country. He would advise his
friend Drake, while yet in time to return,
like the prodigal son mentioned in
Scripture, to his father's house, confessing
himself no more worthy to be called
son.

Mr. Drake replied by an allusion to
a probable exclusion of the Democracy
from power until some far dis-
tant date in the future. In response to Mr.
Saulsbury he had only to say that the
prodigal prodigal, after leaving his
father's house, consumed his substance
in riotous living, and after that he re-
turned. The Democratic party of
outh had left him, (Duke,) and spent
its substance in riotous living, treason
and rebellion against the government,
and when by reason of their course they
had been reduced to feeding on husks
and had repented, he would receive them
back. Never would he go back
to them.

Mr. Saulsbury said the parallel of
the prodigal did not hold good in
so particular in reference to Mr.
Drake; for, while the former, after leaving
the father's house, had to feed upon
husks, like swine, the latter, since he
became a prodigal, had fared more
sumptuously than ever.

Mr. Drake then withdrew his amend-
ment, and upon his motion, in order to
convene time, the bill was laid aside
and the bill of last session, to promote
the securing of efficient seamen for the
navy of the United States was substi-
tuted, and passed.
