The Next State to Vote.

Connecticut is the next State to vote this spring, following New Hampshire on the 3d proximo. It is the most wavering of all New England States and is liable to frequent mutations.

If we accept New Hampshire as a basis to predict the result upon, Connecticut will be represented in the next Congress by at least three Democrats.

FRANCE.

Paris, March 24.—The city is in a terrible state of excitement this morning. The insurgents still continue to excite the wildest terror and alarm by their outrages, and no one's life is considered safe.

Versailles, March 24.—The insurrection in Paris is fast assuming the proportions and horrible character of the Revolution of 1789. Certain quarters are being drenched in blood, while prominent and respectable citizens are hourly assassinated by the mob.

Marseilles, March 24.—It is feared that the insurrectionary movement may extend to this city, and every precaution is being taken to guard against it.

Lyons, March 24.—The "Reds" of this city, aroused by the example of their compatriots in the movement at Paris, have proclaimed a Commune and established a Central Committee similar to that in operation at Paris.

A Distinguished Wedding.

MARRIAGE OF CHIEF JUSTICE CHASE'S DAUGHTER AT WASHINGTON.

The marriage of Miss Nettie Chase, daughter of Chief Justice Chase, and Mr. W. S. Hoyt, of New York, was solemnized in Washington on Thursday, 23d inst., at one o'clock.

St. John's church is situated on the corner of H and 16th streets, west of the school of the rejoicing of all England at the marriage of the Princess Louise, in the same holy season. He is least tendered his church for the service, and Bishop Mellvaine, of Ohio, an old friend of the family, who, not being a High Churchman, had no scruples against celebrating a marriage at this season, performed the ceremony.

The altar-rail was covered with moss and flowers, arranged in fine taste, with large baskets of flowers on the posts of the two gates near either end, and on the front. The church was already well filled half an hour before the time appointed.
