urlington Hawk-Eye, March 18, 1871. The First Colony of the Season to the Burlington & Missouri River Railroad Lands.

On Thursday morning last, the 15th instant, the first colony of the present season, bound to the lands of the B. & M. R. R., passed through this city, at an early hour.

The headquarters and starting point of this colony was at Lynn station, on the Rockford, Rock Island and St. Louis Railroad, a town about thirty miles north of Monmouth, the junction point of the above railroad and the C. B. & Q. R. R.

They consisted of two full train loads of sixteen and fifteen cars respectively, and presented a promising ap pearance for the future, as they passed through the city, running closely to-

The thirty-one cars consisted of four large B. & M. coaches, holding passen gers equivalent to two hundred and ten full fares, six cars horses, eight cars cows and young cattle, five cars household goods, and eight car wagons and agricultural implements. They were destined to the lands laying around and about Red Oak Junction, and the B. & M. branch road to Nebraska City.

We understand that this is the first of a series of such trains, which will be run during the season for the transportation of colonists and settlers bound to the B. & M. lands in Southern Iowa and Nebraska.
