"The School Law of 1854, section 23, defining the 'General Powers and duties of Directors,' among other things provides 'That they shall establish a sufficient number of common schools for the education of every individual above the age of five and under twenty one years who may apply for

"They shall cause suitable lots of ground to be provided, and suitable buildings to be little fellow shouted "Gerliah!" erected, purchased, or rented for school houses, and shall supply the same with proper convenience and fuel."

This mandatory law for more than eighteen years has stood upon our Statute books, and delegates to the Directors all the power they possess relative to the use of school property, and no legislature has attempted to repeal or modify it."
