Section 10. That so much of every act of Assembly as provides that only white freemen shall be entitled to vote, or be registered as voters, or as claiming to vote at any general or special election of this Commonwealth, be and the same all freemen without distinction of color. shall be enrolled and registered according to the provisions of the first section of the act approved the 17th of April, 1869, entitled, "An act further supplemental to an act relative to the elections
