MURDEROUS ASSAULT—Judge Andrews living near Laurel Hill, made a murderous assault upon one of his men on Monday last, striking him first with a chair and then with a poker, inflicting several injuries. We have not learned further particulars.

ACCIDENT—Last Friday the 123d inst., while John Van Orsdahl, was engaged drawing logs into J. S. Hyde's saw mill, at this place, the logs slipped over the logs, and dealt him a severe blow over the eye, rendering him first with a concussion for a short time. The escape from death in this instance is remarkable, for had the blow been direct, a fatal accident would have been the consequence. The patient at this writing is doing well.
