SUBSTITUTE FOR COFFEE.—Chicory, which has to overcome some strong prejudices before it can take the place of coffee, has been reinforced for the struggle by chemical analysis, which tells us that the percentage of nutritious substance in chicory is more than twice as great as that of coffee. It is largely used by the poor people of Europe, and has found its way into hospitals on account of its nutritious qualities and a total absence of nervous stimulating qualities. Chicory or Succory is a plant which grows wild in Europe, but is sometimes cultivated. The roots are kiln-dried, roasted, and grown into a brownish red powder, to be used either for mixture with or as a substitute for coffee.

MORE CURRENCY.—Following is the text of an important bill which passed the United States Senate on Monday to increase the value of circulating medium:

That the maximum amount of United States notes is hereby fixed at \$400,000,000, in notes for circulation, in addition to such circulation now allowed by law. They shall be issued to national banking associations now organized, and which may be organized hereafter, and such increased circulation shall be distributed among the several States as provided in section one of an act to provide for the redemption of the three per centum treasury notes, certificates, and for an increase of national bank notes, approved July 11, 1870; and each national banking association now organized, or hereafter to be organized, shall keep and maintain as part of its reserve required by law, one-fourth part of the coin received by it, as interest on bonds of the United States, deposited as securities for circulating notes on government deposits, and that hereafter only one-fourth of the reserve now prescribed by law for national banking associations shall consist of balances due to an association, available for the redemption of its circulating notes from associations in cities of redemption, and upon which no interest shall be paid.
