THE NEW SENATOR FROM MASSA-CHUSETIS .- Wm. B. Washburn, who has been elected to the United States from Massachusetts to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Charles Sumner, was born in Winchendon, Mass., January \$1, 1820. He graduated at Yale College in 1844, and subsequently engaged in the business of manufacturing. In 1854 he was a State Senator, and in 1854 a representative in the Legislature of Massachusetts. He was subsequently President of the Greenfield (Mass.) bank. In 1862 he was elected a Representative to the Thirty eighth Congress, and was re-elected to the Thirtyninth and Fortieth Congresses. His latest political success prior to that which he now enjoys was his election to the Governorship of Massachusetts, in the nomination for which office by the Republican State Convention he defeafed General Butler.

A MRS. COWDEN, died in Corry, on Saturday, April 11th, under suspicious circumstances. She, with her husband and two children, lived in a miserable shanty, scarcely fit to shelter cattle. Cowden is a shoemaker, a good workman, and capable of earning enough to support his family in comfort, but he squandered his wages for rum. He was absent when his wife died. The hove was nearly destitute of furniture or provisions, and entirely without fire or fuel. A post-mortem examination disclosed the fact that Mrs. Cowden's death was ceused by ill-treatment and neglect on the part of her husband-that she was literally starved to death! She was found without a dress or underclothing, covered with rags. The worse than brute, Cowden. was arrested and taken to Erie for trial. His hineous crime should bring him severe punishment.


