gregate amount of ingrain carpets made there exceeds the total of similar goods

manufactured elsewhere throughout the United States. There are now in Philadelphia about 250 factories, with 4000 looms, and before the strike the production averaged 14,000 pieces of 125 yards each, or 1,750,000 yards per month, or 17,000,000 yards for the ten months that the factories are in operation. In the busy season about 6,000 persons are employed in the factories directly, independent of the Jryers and others remotely interested, involving a monthly outlay for wages of about \$300 .-000. The amount of capital invested may be estimated from the fact that the yearly sale of carpets alone, reach over
