"Any person furnishing intoxicating drinks to any other person in violation of any existing law, or of the provisions of this act, shall be held civilly responsible for any injury to persons or property in consequence of such furnishing and any one aggrivated may recover full damages against such persons so turnishing, by action on the case, instituted in any court having jurisdiction of form of action in this State."
