WHO IS WIMMER? is the question now eagerly asked by the citizens of Elk County. Brandon of the Gazette in his last issue has thrown some light upon the subject, by saying that he (Wimmer) is a high minded honorable gentleman. We had always heard him spoken of as high minded, and now as Brandon says so it will not be denied. Brandon also says that this campaign is to decide some vital questions such as to elect a United States Senator, he should also have added for the benefit of the voters of Elk county, if not for Mr. Wimmer, that a bill for the equalization of freights will be before the house, this coming winter, which we think of far more importance to the people of Elk county. This, however, does not answer the question asked.

Until the present campaign, Mr. Wimmer, heard of only as in the capacity of agent and engineer for the Pennsylvania Rail Road company, and as such we must regard him, notwithstanding his denial. We can therefore, only accept him as a man imported by the Rail Road monopoly to gain strength for them, and to further advance their interests at the peril of the citizens whom he expects to support him.

In the language of the Gazette "it behooves the citizens of Elk County not to follow personal inclinations" but vote for the man whom, they well know, if elected will advance the interest of Elk County and its citizens and not of monopolists.

CHALLENGING VOTERS.—Under the election law when a vote is challenged the examination of the right of the person to vote must be made publicly and acted on by the election board. To do it with closed doors, as has been the case heretofore sometimes, is unlawful. Qualified citizens of the election district only have the right to challenge.

Election Proclamation.

WHEREAS, in and by the 13th section of the Act of General Assembly of Pennsylvania, passed July 2nd 1869, entitled, "An act relating to the Elections of the Commonwealth," it is enjoined on the Sheriff of every county to give notice of such elections to be held, and to enumerate in such notice what officers are to be elected, in pursuance thereof, I, D. C. OYSTER, High Sheriff of the County of Elk, do therefore make known and give this public notice to the electors of said county of Elk, that a general election will be held in said county, on

Tuesday November 3, 1874, (at being the first Tuesday of the month.) for the purpose of electing the following officers, to-wit:

One person for Judge of the Supreme Court.
One person for Lieutenant Governor.
One person for Secretary of Internal Affairs.
One person for Auditor General.
One person for Congress, to represent the counties of Centre, Clearfield, Clinton, Elk, Mifflin and Union.
One person for Assembly for Elk County.
One person for Sheriff of Elk County.
One person for Commissioner of Elk County.
One person for Auditor of Elk County.

And the qualified electors of the county of Elk will hold their elections in the several districts, as follows:

Jones township, at the Wilcox Tanning and Lumber Co's office in Wilcox.
Mill Store township, at the house of Henry Herr, at Farr's Dam.

I also make known the following not entitled "An act regulating the mode of voting at all elections in the several counties of the Commonwealth," as amended, required by the second section of said act:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives, &c., That the qualified voters of the several counties of this Commonwealth, at all general town, ward and special elections are hereby hereafter authorized and required to vote by ticket, printed or written, or partly written and partly printed, severally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all the judges of the Courts to be voted for and to be labelled on the outside, "Judiciary"; and one ticket shall embrace the names of all State officers to be voted for and labelled "State," or one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers to be voted for, including the office of Senator, member or members of Assembly, if voted for, members of Congress, if voted for and labelled "County;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all township officers to be voted for and be labelled "Borough" or "Township;" and each shall be deposited in separate ballot boxes.

I also make known and give notice, as in and by the 10th section of aforesaid act, I and direct that for every person claiming to be a citizen of this Commonwealth, who shall be called upon to vote at an election, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be punished in a like manner as is provided in the second section of this act, in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful ballot or ballots.

SECTION 2. That if any person shall be called upon to vote at an election, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be punished in a like manner as is provided in the second section of this act, in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful ballot or ballots.

SECTION 3. That if any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, shall at an election, hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, vote or tender to the officer thereof, and offer to vote, a ballot, or ballots any person so offending, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, shall, for each offense, be punished in a like manner as is provided in the preceding section of this act, in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful ballot or ballots.

SECTION 4. That if any person shall hereafter persuade, or advise, any person or persons deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, to offer any ballot, or ballots, to the officers of any election hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, or shall persuade, or advise, any such officer to receive any ballot, or ballots, from any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, such person, so offending, shall be guilty, of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, in any court or quarter sessions of this Commonwealth shall be punished in a like manner as is provided in the second section of this act, in the case of officers of such election receiving such unlawful ballot, or ballots.

I also make known the following sections of an act regulating the 30th day of January, A. D. 1874, entitled "A further supplement to the act regulating elections in this Commonwealth:"

SECTION 5. At all elections hereafter held under the laws of this Commonwealth, the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock A. M. and closed at seven o'clock P. M.

SECTION 6. In all election districts where a vacancy exists by reason of the disqualification of the officer or otherwise in an election board heretofore appointed, or where any new district shall be formed, the judge or judges of the court of common pleas of the proper county shall, ten days before any general or special election, appoint competent persons to fill said vacancies and in such election in said new districts; and in the appointment of inspectors in any election district both shall not be of the same political party; and the judge of elections shall, in all cases, be of the political party having the majority of votes in said district, as nearly as the said judge or judges can ascertain the fact; and in case of the disagreement of the judges as to the selection of inspectors, the political majority of the judges shall select one of such inspectors, and the minority judge or judges shall select the other.

SECTION 7. Whenever there shall be a vacancy in an election board on the morning of an election, said vacancy shall be filled in conformity with existing laws.

SECTION 8. At the opening of the polls at all elections it shall be the duty of the judges of election for their respective districts to designate one of the inspectors, whose duty it shall be to have in custody the registry of voters, and to make the entries therein required by law; and it shall be the duty of the other of said inspectors to receive and number the ballots presented at said election.

SECTION 9. All elections by the citizens shall be by ballot; every ballot voted shall be numbered in the order in which it shall be received, and the number recorded by the clerks on the list of voters opposite the name of the elector from whom received. And any voter voting two or more tickets, the several tickets so voted shall each be numbered with the number corresponding with the number to the name of the voter. Any elector may write his name upon his ticket, or cause the same to be written thereon, and attested by a citizen of the district.

SECTION 10. On the day of election any person whose name shall not appear on the registry of voters, and who claims the right to vote at said election, shall produce at least one qualified voter of the district as a witness to the residence of the claimant in the district in which he claims to be a voter, for the period of at least two months immediately preceding said election, which witness shall be sworn or affirmed and subscribe a written or partly written and partly printed affidavit to the facts stated by him, which affidavit shall define clearly where the residence is of the person so claiming to be a voter; and the person so claiming the right to vote shall also take and subscribe a written or partly written and partly printed affidavit, stating to the best of his knowledge and belief, when and where he was born; that he has been a citizen of the United States for one month, and of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania; that he has resided in the Commonwealth one year, or, if formerly a qualified elector or a native born citizen thereof, and has removed therefrom and returned, that he has resided therein six months next preceding said election; that he has resided in the district in which he claims to be a voter for the period of at least two months immediately preceding said election; that he has not moved into the district for the purpose of voting therein; that he has, if twenty-two years of age or upwards, paid a state or county tax within two years, which was assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election. The said affidavit shall also state when and where the tax claimed to be paid by the affiant was assessed, and when and where and

to whom paid; and the tax receipt therefor shall be produced for examination, unless the affiant shall state in his affidavit that it has been lost or destroyed, or that he never received any; and if a naturalized citizen, shall also state when, where and by what court he was naturalized, and shall also produce his certificate of naturalization for examination. But if the person so claiming the right to vote shall take and subscribe an affidavit that he is a native born citizen of the United States, or, if born elsewhere, shall state the fact in his affidavit, and shall produce evidence that he has been naturalized or that he is entitled to citizenship by reason of his father's naturalization, and shall further state in his affidavit, that he is, at the time of making the affidavit, of the age of twenty-one and under twenty-two years; that he has been a citizen of the United States one month, and has resided in the state one year; or, if a native born citizen of the state and removed therefrom and returned, that he has resided therein six months next preceding said election, and in the election district immediately two months preceding such election, he shall be entitled to vote, although he shall not have paid taxes. The said affidavits of all persons making such claims and the affidavits of the witnesses to their residence shall be preserved by the election board, and at the close of the election they shall be enclosed with the list of voters, tally list and other papers required by law to be filed by the return judge with the prothonotary, and shall remain on file therein in the prothonotary's office, subject to examination as other election papers are. If the election officers shall find that the applicant possesses all the legal qualifications of a voter he shall be permitted to vote, and his name shall be added to the list of taxable by the election officers, the word "tax," being added where the claimant claims to vote on tax, and the word "age," where he claims to vote on age; the same words being added by the clerks in each case, respectively, on the lists of persons voting at such election.

SECTION 11. It shall be lawful for any qualified citizen of the district, notwithstanding the name of the proposed voter is contained on the list of resident taxpayers, to challenge the vote of such person, whereupon the same proof of the right of suffrage as is now required by law shall be publicly made and acted on by the election board, and the vote admitted or rejected, according to the evidence. Every person claiming to be a naturalized citizen shall be required to produce his naturalization certificate at the election before voting, except where he has been for five years consecutively a voter in the district in which he offers his vote; and on the vote of such person being received, it shall be the duty of the election officers to write or stamp on such certificate the word "write," with the day, month and year; and if any election officer or officers shall receive a second vote on the day, by virtue of the same certificate, excepting where sons are entitled to vote, because of the naturalization of their fathers, they and the person who shall offer such second vote, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined or imprisoned, or both, at the discretion of the court; but the fine shall not exceed five hundred dollars in each case, nor the imprisonment one year. The like punishment shall be inflicted, on conviction on the officers of election who shall neglect or refuse to make, or cause to be made the endorsement required as aforesaid on said naturalization certificate.

PART OF SECTION 19. Any person who, on the day of any election, visit a polling place in any election district at which he is not entitled to vote, and shall use any intimidation or violence for the purpose of preventing any officer of election from performing the duties required of him by law, or for the purpose of preventing any qualified voter of such district exercising his right to vote, or from exercising his right to challenge any person offering to vote, such person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding two years, or both, at the discretion of the court.

SECTION 21. Any person who, on oath or affirmation, in or before any court in this state, or officer authorized to administer oaths, shall, procure a certificate of naturalization for himself or any other person wilfully deposit, declare or affirm any matter to be fact, knowing the same to be false, or shall in like manner deny any matter to be fact, knowing the same to be true, shall be deemed guilty of perjury; and any certificate of naturalization issued in pursuance of any such deposition, declaration or affirmation, shall be null and void, and it shall be the duty of the court issuing the same, upon proof being made before it that it was fraudulently obtained, to take immediate measures for recalling the same for cancellation; and any person who shall vote or attempt to vote on any paper so obtained, or who shall in any way aid in, connive at, or have any agency whatever in the issue, circulation or use of any fraudulent naturalization certificate, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall undergo an imprisonment in the penitentiary for not more than two years, and pay a fine not more than one thousand dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding two years, or both, at the discretion of the court.

Pursuant to the provisions contained in the thirteenth section of the act last aforesaid, the judges of the aforesaid districts shall respectively take charge of the return sheets, tally papers and oaths of officers of their respective districts and deliver them over to the prothonotary at Ridgway on the days mentioned in said section.
