#### THE FINANCE BILL PASSED.

The Senate Finance Bill was passed in the House at Washington yesterday by an almost strictly party vote, there not being a Democratic vote recorded in its favor! It would appear that the Democracy funcied the Republicans were stealing their political thunder in preparing the way out of our financial difficulties, and so far as was in their power they have hindered and endeavored to prevent the passage of any financial measure. While a majority of the State delegations in the House voted against the Scoate bill yesterday. it was supported by a majority of the delegations from New England, New South Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, California and Kansas. The Pennsylvania delegation voted as follows:

Yeas-Messrs. 1 O'Neil, Myers. Harmer, Biery, Smith, Killinger, Shoemaker Strawbridge, Packer, Cessna, Curtis. Richmond, Taylor, Negley, Thompson, Moor, Todd and Scoffeld Townsend, Clymer, Storm and Magee.

Meesrs. Spear, Albright and Ross were absent.

The bill now goes to the President for his approval, which it will receive as it in main, conforms with the recom. memdations of his late message. The main features of the bill are reproduced for the benefit of those of our readers who may not be acquainted with them:

First-Free banking, to be open to all individuals and associations without limitation of capital.

Second -The retiring of an amount of greenbacks equal to eighty per cent. of the amount of new national notes issued until the greenback circulation shall be reduced to \$300,000,000, after which no further reduction of greenbacks is to take place, (It is claimed that by this provision there will be neither expansion nor contraction of the currency, as about twenty per cent. is now required as bank reserves.)

Third-The withdrawal and destruction of fractional currency and the substituien of silver coin, the arrangement to go into effect as soon as practicable. under direction of the Sccretary of the Treasnry, who is authorized to use surplus money for supplying silver coin, and if this is not sufficient, to sell the requisite amount of bends of the new series to obtain funds for that purpose. Fourth-The removing of the cost for the coinage of gold at the several

Fifth-The resumption of specie payments to commence on the first day of January, 1879, The Secretary is authorized to use the surplus specie in the Treasury, but, if that is not sufficient, to sell bonds in order to obtain gold to pay Treasury notes.
