A BOLD ROBBERY.

BANK ENTERED AT MIDDAY, AND THE CASHIER BOUND AND GAGGED. Scranton, I'a. Jan. 14 .- A daring and successful descent was made upon history: the First National Bank of Carbondale at 12:15 P. M. to-day, while the teller, G. D. Couch, and another clerk were absent at dinner, leaving the eashier, James Stott, alone in the bank, Mr. Stoft is quite an old man, and is in very feeble health. Two men came in by a front door of the bank, and one of them asked for the change of a \$5 note. Mr. Stott stooped over to comply

with the request, when one of the men grabbed him by the head, pinning it to the desk, and the other jumped over the counter and bound and gagged him. The robbers then hastily gathered up all the currency they could find amounting to about \$10,000, fortunately 000. They were disturbed by a woman coming to a front door, and retreated by a back door, crossing the river on the ice, and were seen to enter a sleigh and drive off. After they had gone, a little terrier dog entered the boat evidently in search of its master.
