COLONEL BUTLER'S MURDERER IN 1874 CAUGUT IN 1875.

Williamsport March 29 .- In October, 864, Colonel Butler, of Brookville, Jefferson county, was directed to arrest Joseph Louisberry, of Clearfield, for desertion. Lounsberry had openly declared that he wolud shoot whoever undertook his arrest, and made his word good by killing Colonel Butler on the spot, shooting him with a rfle. This was in Clearfield county. The New Liquor Law.

The following is the text of the Local Option repeal act as passed finally

by the Legislature: SECTION 1. Bs it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the act approved the 27th day of March, A. D., 1872, entitled, "An act or administrator without limit as to to permit the voters of this Commonwealth to vote every three years on the granting licenses to sell intoxicating liquors," be and the same is hereby re-

SECTION 2. That licenses for sales of liquors shall be granted by the Court of Quarter Sessions of the proper county, at the first and second session in each year, and shall be for one year. The said court shall fix by rule or standing order a time at which application tor said licenses shall be heard, at which time all persons applying or making objections to applications for licenses may be heard by evidence, petition, remonstrance or counsel; provided that for the present year licenses as aforesaid may be granted at the third or any earlier session of said court.

SECTION 3. That all hotels, ions and taverus shall be classified and rated according to the last annual return of the merchantile appraiser or assessor of the proper city or county, as follows, to wit: All cases where the classification shall be ten thousand dollars or moreshall constitute the first class, and pay seven hundred dollars; where the classification shall be eight thousand dollars, and not more than ten thousand dollars. the second class, and shall pay six hundred dollars; where the classification is six thousand dollars and not eight thousand dollars, the third class, and shall pay three hundred dollars; where the classification shall be four thousand dollars, and not more than six thousand dollars, the fourth class, and shall pay two hundred dollars; where the classification shall be less than four thouand dollars, the fifth, class and shall pay fifty dollars. Provided, that no license shall be less than fifty dollars. And provided further, that any person licensed the present or any portion of a year shall pay a pro rata share of the license fee, and the authority granting the license shall designate the classification for the year. And provided further, that no license for bottles shall be less ban one hundred dollars.

SECTION 4. That any state made of rinous, spirituous, mult or brewed iquors, or any admixture thereof, contrary to the provisions of this law, shall be taken to be a misdemeanor, and upon the conviction of offence in the court of quarter sessions of the peace of any city or county, the person so offending shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than two hundred nor more than five hundred dollars, with the costs of prosecution, and to stand convieted until the sentence of the Court is complied with, not exceeding ninety days, and upon a second or subsequent conviction the party so offending shall pay a fine of not less than five hundred nor more than one thousand dollars, and undergo imprisonment in the county jail of not less than three months nor more than one year, and if licensed shall in lew of licence, and be inempacitated from receiving any license, as aforesaid, for the period of five years thereafter and any keeper of any drug or apothecary store, confectionary or mineral or other fountain, who shall sell any spiritous, vinous, malt or brewed liquors, mixed or pure. to be used as a beverage, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and liable to the same conviction and punshment as unlicensed offenders.

SECTION 5. That the fives, as well as the proceeds of all forteited bonds, as aforesaid, shall be paid to the county treasury, except in the cities containing more than one hundred thousand inhabitants, where they shall be paid to the city treasurer, to be applied for school purposes; and nothing herein contained shall prevent any such informer or prosecutor from becoming a witness in any such case.

Section 6. That the constable of the respective wards, boroughs and townships shall make return of retailers of liquors, and in addition therto it shall be the duty of every such constable, at each term of the Court of Quarter Sessions of their respective counties, to make return on oath or affirmation whether, within his knowledge, there is any unlicensed place within his bailiwick kept and maintained in violation of this act, and it shall be the especial duty of the judges of all said courts to see that this return is faithfully made; and if any person shall make known in The appointee must be over fourteen writing, with his or her name subscribed thereto, to such constable, the name or names of any one who shall have violated this act, with the names of the witness who can prove the fact. it shall be his duty to make return thereof, on oath or affirmation, to the Court, and upon his willful failure to do so he shall be deemed guilty of the crime of perjury, and upon indictment and conviction shall be subjected to its penalties.

SECTION 7. Any person who shall, by the sale of intoxicating liquor, with or without a license, cause the intoxication in whole or in part of any other person shall be liable for and be compelled to pay a reasonable compensation to any person who may take charge of and provide for such intoxicated person for every day he or she is so cared for, which sum may be recovered in an action of debt before any court of justices of the peace having jurisdiction under

No person or persons nea-resident of this Commonwealth shall engage in selling, trading or vending ntoxicating liquor, and no bawker, peddler or traveling agent shall engage in selling for any person or persons who are non-residente, or in vending, trading or contracting in any manner whatsoever in intoxicating liquor within the limits of this Commonwealth.

Section 10. Any bond given by any person under the provisions of this act may be canceled after thirty days notice in writing shall have been given and received by the respective parties thereto; provided, the sureties to be released from such or any bond shall bear no risk pending thereon. In the event of canceling any bond and the relessing of the sureties the principal shall provide acceptible substitutes if he desires to continue the business, otherwise his license shall immediately

be revoked. SECTION 11. That no license to sell ntoxicating drinks shall hereafter be granted to any person until he shall have executed a bond to the Commonwealth in the penal sum of two thousand dollars with two sufficient sureties to be approved by the Court granting such liceuse conditioned to pay all damages which may be recovered in any action which may be instituted against him under the provisions of this act and all costs, fines and penalties, which may be imposed upon him in any indictment for violating this act or any other law of this Commonwealth relating to selling or furnishing intoxicating drinks. and the said bond shall be filled in the office of the Clerk of said Court for the use and benefit of all persons interested

therein. SECTION 12. That it shall not be awful for any person with or without iceuse to sell to any person any intexicating drink on any day on which elections are now or hereafter may be required to be held, nor on Sunday nor at iny time to a minor or to a person visi-

ly affected by intoxicating drinks. SECTION 13. That the husband, wife, parent, child, employee, guardian. eacher, or person legally in charge of ony person to whom intoxicating drinks shall be furnished in violation of this act or any law of this Commonwealth. shall have the right to recover in all action in the case whatever damages may have been sustained by him or her directly or indirectly by reason of such furnishing either in person, property. means of support or otherwise; minors and married women suing by their next friend, and for their own use and bene-

Section 14. That any person who shall hereafter be convicted of selling or offering for sale any intoxicating liquors, without a license, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of two hundred ollars, and confinement in the county jail for three months, for the first ofsequent offense, a fine of five hundred dollars and confinement in the county jail for six months; and any person havng such license, who shall be convicted of violating any license law of this Commonwealth, shall be sentenced to a fine of two hundred dollars, and for a second or each subsequent offense, a fine of hree hundred dollars. A conviction or a second offense shall work a forteiture of bond and license in addition o fine imposed.

SECTION 15. That any license here. ofore granted shall not be invalidated, and that none of the provisions of this act shall be held to authorize the manufacture or sale of any intoxicating quors in any city, county borough or township having local or special prohibitory laws.
