#### Household Helps.

Coldslaw.-Yolks of two eggs; a tablespoonful of cream; a small tea-spoonful of mustard; a little salt; two not used, put in a small lump of butter rubbed in a little flour. Cut the cabbage very fine; heat the mixture, and pour it on hot.

VENISON STEAKS.-Cut them from the neck; season them with pepper and salt. When the gridiron has been well heated over a bed of bright coals, grease the bars, and lay the steaks upon it. Broil them well, turning them once, and taking care to save as much of the gravy as possible. Serve them up with some currant jelly laid on each steak.

LEMON CAKE. - Three cupfuls of powfour cupfuls of flour. Beat the butter and then dissolve a little soda in the milk; mix all together; then sift the flour and put in by degrees, and add the juice and grated peel of a fresh lemon. This cake

PRICASSEE OF FOWLS BROWN.-Broil as for pot-pie, then fry slowly in butter until browned; toast bread and lay it on the platter under the chicken. Pour a little of the broth in the spider with the browned butter, thicken with flour, season to suit, and pour it over the chicken; or if you want it very nice, add the butter for the gravy to the butter in which the chicken was browned; dredge with flour, add salt and pepper, brown well, and lastly, add the chicken broth.

SCRAP PUDDING .- Put the scraps of bread, crust and crumb, into a bowl, with sufficient milk to cover them well. Cover with a saucepan lid or plate, and put it into the oven to soak for half an hour. Take it out and mash the bread a teaspoonful of brown sugar, half a cup hour and a half.

#### Feeding Hogs Corn Menl.

On the second day of last December, writes a correspondent, I weighed twentysix hogs, the aggregate being 4,960 pounds, or an average of one hundred and ninety and one-half pounds per head. They were then fed six weeks on corn meal. The first week they consumed twenty-nine and one-quarter bushels, and gained four hundred and seventytwo pounds; second week they were fed ame, twenty-nine and one-quarter bushels, and gained three hundred and consuming seventy-one and one-quarter bushels and gained nine hundred and forty five pounds. The sixth week they were fed twenty-nine and one-quarter bushels and gained three hundred and thirty-five cents per hundred, which paid of their gain was owing to the cold weather part of the time. My experience is that ground corn will make one-fourth more pork to the bushel when fed in a whole state. This experiment was the three times a day in a good, tight, warm

rapidity with which it springs up again after being cropped. It produces excel-lent milk, and yields a very large amount of feed.

A Maine farmer says he thinned out the small branches of his apple trees after the fruit had formed—taking off about half of the fruit. On gathering the apples in the fall he found them nearly double the size of previous years, and about the usual quantity in bushels.

The seed of the pine should be sown in spring. The soil should be mold and sand, with sufficient sand to prevent the ground baking when dry. The bed must be kept moist, though not wet. Drenching it should be avoided.

A chicken raiser says he cures gapes in chickens by the application of air slaked lime. The chickens inhale the dust of the lime and this causes them to sneeze, which throws out the worms.

# For Careless Farmers.

We trust that the following does not apply to any of the readers of this paper : The following advice to farmers has been tried in various sections with most astonishing success: Leave your reaper out of doors, run your horse rake in fence corners, throw your hand rake on the barn floor, let the cattle and hogs have the run of your small orehard, keep your fence corners full of briars, cultivate the succulent burdock and the farinaceous jimpson weed, don't lay up a fallen rail or restore a dilapidated gap, make your cowyard and woodpile in front of your house. After having thoroughly attended to these things, use your spare time going around complaining of hard times and bad crops.

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
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
