Pottsville, June 4.—Everything is reported quiet this morning about Mahanoy City. The raiders disbanded and scattered throughout the neighboring country. The collieries stopped yesterday commenced work this morning unmolested.

There was much excitement this morning at St. Clair and Woodsdale. A party of strikers from Heinsville, Glen Carbin and that vicinity have stopped Deming & Co's colliery at Woodsdale, and driven the miners away.

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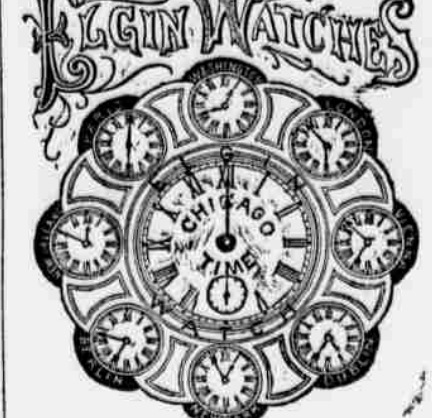
