TWENTY-ONE B USINESSS HOUSES BURNED-CVER \$100,000 WORTH OF PROPERTY DESTROYED-AN INCEN-DIARY THE CAUSE.

A terribly destructive fire occured at Reynoldsville on the morning of Sunday last breaking out at about three o'clock in one of the back rooms of the Arcade Block, owned by Reilly, and soon the entire building was one sheet of flames. communicating with other buildings on all sides, and although the greatest efforts were made to stay the progress of til twenty-one business places, embracing many of the finest in the place, were laid low, and presented nothing but a black, smoking mass, dismal in the extreme and disheartening especially to those whose entire worldly effects had gone up in smoke and flame. The buildings were all of the most combustible material, and burned at a fearful rate, making it a difficult task to contest its progress, and it does seem wonderful that it ever stopped where it did, the charred buildings remaining attesting the persistence of those working for the safety of their own and neighbors' property.

The cause of the fire is supposed to be the work of an incendiary, and Reilly, one of the sufferers, was arrested on a charge of being the guilty party, but no evidence appearing against him he was discharged. We learn that several other parties are strongly suspicioned, and are being watched. Considerable stealing was done during the fire, and several candidates for our county jail are already ticketed.

From the Herald we learn that many of those who were burned out are al ready making preparations for rebuilding, and that the damage inflicted by Sunday morning's disaster will soon be overcome, and the town present its usual prosperous appearance. Brookville Republican.
