## The Last Rites. The stranger in Smethport on Sun-

day last would have known that au honored citizen of the place had passed away. The largest concourse of people that we have ever seen together on a similar occasion filled the Court House to overflowing to pay a fitting tribute of respect to the memory of a good man and respected citizen, Sheriff M. N. Powell. The funeral services were advertised to take place at 101 A. M., but were necessarily delayed to await the coming of Mr. Jerome Powell sr., of Ridgway, who had been unable to reach here before because of the sad necessity of attending the funeral of another brother in White Plains, N. Y., who died in nearly the same way that did the Sheriff. A large delegation of citizens of Kane, the former residence of the deceased, were present, as well as nearly every citizen of Smethport and many other sympathising friends, and at half past eleven the entire seating capacity of the Court House was filled the crowd being to large to be accommodated in any one of the churches. A more solemn and impressive service we never attended. Rev. S. D. Morris, preached the funeral discourse, and it was one of his most eloquent efforts. He chose his text from the seventh Oh! those beautiful prints at P. & chapter of Ecclesiastics the 1st and 2nd verses. The text was very appropriate to the death of a good man, and so impressively and effectively was the lesson brought out that there was scarcely a dry eye in the house during the entire service.
