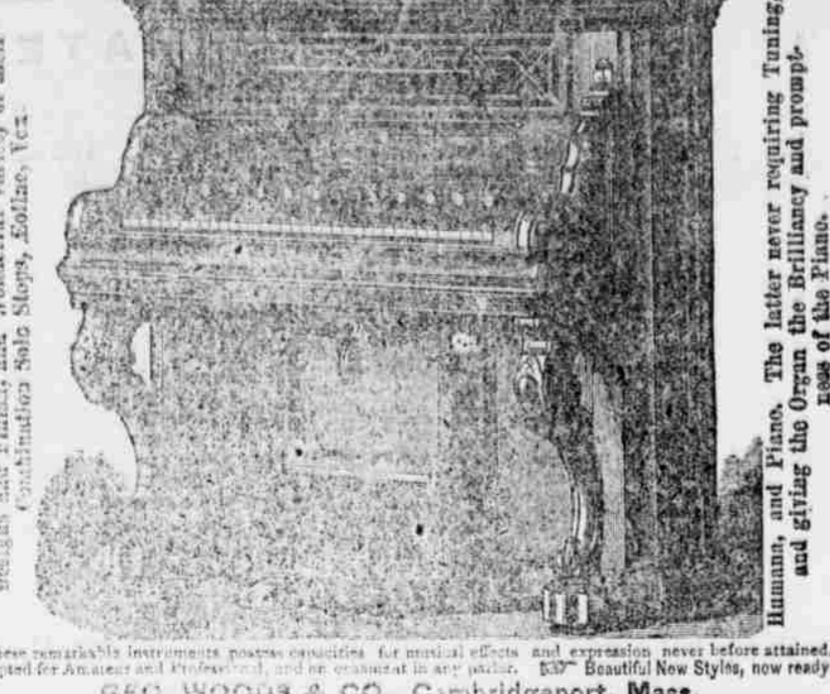

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### Elk Advocate.

THURSDAY, APRIL 23RD, 1870.  
The Elk County Sunday School Convention.  
HAYDN in his dictionary of dates says that "the first Sunday School was founded by Ludwig Haeker between the years 1740 and 1747" at Ephrata, Lancaster Co., Pa., among the German seventh-day Baptists there. If Haydn's statement be true then let the fact be entered up to the memory of Ludwig Haeker and to the credit of Lancaster Co., Pa. Whether the first county Sunday school convention was held in Philadelphia does not record, neither does he say whether, when, or where one was ever held in Elk County, but in some future edition of his invaluable dictionary it may be stated that the first Elk Co. Sunday school convention was held at Ridgway, on Tuesday and Wednesday April 18th, and 19th, 1870, and closely associated with it among other names will be that of Rev. B. Crittenden, Bellefonte, Pa. The Rev. gentleman just named is a missionary of the American Sunday School Union and has been laboring zealously among the people of this county and was instrumental in calling the convention. As per call and announcement in the county papers the convention met at the M. E. Church at Ridgway at 3 p. m. on Tuesday April 18th. The time appointed was unfortunately not a suitable one to secure a large attendance of Sunday school workers. Rev. Wm. Hoffman, Wilcox; Rev. R. White St. Mary's, and Rev. I. Breuneman Ridgway, I am told were away from the county attending their respective synods, while Rev. Chibout, Bellefonte, Rev. Wm. J. Miller, Ridgway, and several others were kept away on account of sickness and death. From the above statement it may be readily observed that the looking for at the convention was not large. I have not been furnished with the names of the delegates which I hoped to receive from the committee on delegates, hence they do not appear here.

The Convention was called upon by the chair to open the debate which he did and tried in the course of his remarks to give some of the duties as follows:  
1st. Punctuality.  
2nd. Should study to possess executive ability.  
3rd. Introduce a variety of exercises to conform with the nature of the children.  
4th. Keep all busy and not try to do everything himself.  
5th. Be decisive and firm.  
J. O. W. Bailey was next called upon who strengthened the points already given and added one more that the superintendant should have frequent reviews. Rev. Martin followed and said the first great duty of a superintendent was "to give his heart to God," and closed his speech by taking decided exceptions to the 4th point made by the Secy. viz—"It was not the duty of a superintendant to do everything himself." Also objected to the 3rd point viz—"variety of exercises." Rev. Martin brought a Sunday school like an army of soldiers. Rev. Yingling followed and differed from Martin on the points mentioned. The chairman then reviewed the points and added two others. 1st. Study to know your pupils and teachers. 2nd. Keep up with the times. After which the convention adjourned to meet on Wednesday morning, at 9 a. m.
