> The progress of work on the Mississippi river jetties has gone so far that Captain Eads was recently enabled to close up Grand Bayou, a channel that has heretofore drawn off about one-third of the water of the South Pass. The closing of this bayou so increased the current through the pass that in less than two days the channel was deepened more than a foot through the greatly increased scour. Captain Eads thinks that this will soon tell on the main bar, and, in fact, the pilots say its effects is already so marked that they can take over the main bar any vessel drawing twenty feet of water.
