The Stay Law Unconstitutional. Philadelphia Evening Telegraph, April 19. An important decision with regard to the stay law passed at the last session of the legislature has been made by Judge M Dermitt, of Mercer county, which practically nullifies some of its nfost essential and most objectionable features. Judge M'Dermitt declares that this law so far as it gives a stay of execution on contracts which waive such stay, is clearly, plainly and palpably in violation of the provisions of the constitutions of the United States and of the state of Pennsylvania, which prohibit the passage of ex post facto laws and laws impairing the ob-Hyations of contracts. Its meaning on some points is not by any means clear, and its authors appear to have intentionally made a muddle of it, but if it means anything it-means that a stay of execution may be had in cases where it has been solemnly covenanted that there shall be no such stay.
