Washington, May 5 .- The objections to postponing the extra session have all been waived, and the following was issued this afternoon:

By the President of the United States of America-A PROCLAMA-TION: Whereas, the final adjournment of the Forty-fourth congresswithout making the usual appropriations for the support of the army for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1877, presents an extraordinary occasion requiring the President to exercise the power vested in him by the constitution to convene the house of congress in anticipation of the day fixed by law for their next meeting:

Now, therefore, I Rutherford B. Hayes, President of the United States do by virtue of the power to this end in me vested by the constitution, convene both houses of congress to assemble at their respective chambers at twelve o'clock, noon, on Monday, the 15th day of October next, then and there to consider and determine such measures in their wisdom, their duty and the welfare of the people may order, as I will pay no debts thus conseem to demand.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of Ridgway May 2, 1877. the United States to be affixed.
