Judge Elliott has rendered an opinion adverse to a case Buford had for some time had in court.

From the Williamsport Gazette and Bulletin. Saturday last between twelve and one o'clock, when the Empire freight was passing that point on the Philadelphia and Erie railroad where the lee gorge occurred recently, about five miles above Farmersville, the sudden breaking of an axle caused the wrecking of an oil tank car. Immediately on the breaking of the tank the oil took fire, and in a few minutes a terrible conflagration was raging. The black smoke rolled up in dense volumes darkening the atmosphere, and at times the flames ascended to a height of nearly one hundred feet.

Eleven oil tank cars were destroyed at the point where the accident occurred, which, with the two consumed at North Point, make thirteen altogether. The intense heat caused by the burning oil warped the rails, badly, destroyed the ties completely, and rendered it necessary to rebay about three hundred feet of track before the waiting trains could pass. This was done so speedily that the passenger train was not delayed over an hour, reaching Williamsport soon after midnight. Fortunately no one was injured, though there was great danger from the exploding oil tanks, and the greatest caution had to be observed in handling them.
