Lachawannock.

A LARGE body of LAND on this river

through the whole country.
The main river flows through one tract
of about thirty thousand acres, and is with
the exception of one obstruction, naviga-
ble to the Susquehanna.

Spring Brook Creek, which with its
branches, waters another tract of about
forty thousand acres of good Land, em-
ploys itself into the Lachawannock, about
twelve miles from the Susquehanna.
It affords numerous Mill seats, & in its
course creates large bodies of well water-
ed meadow ground.

The other tracts are intersected by creeks
of considerable importance.
Several Mills are already erected for the
accommodation of the settlers.
Roads are cut in different directions, to
wards the most convenient markets.

STATE OF SOUTH-CAROLINA
In the House of Representatives,

DECEMBER 21st, 1793.
WHEREAS the Commissioners of pub-
lic Accounts, have reported, that they
cannot proceed to the investigation of the
Treasury Accounts, respecting special In-
dents, without knowing the outstanding a-
mount thereof in circulation:—Therefore,
Resolved, That all holders of special In-
dents be directed, and required, on or before
the first day of November next, to deliver the
special Indents in their possession to one of
either of the Commissioners of the Treasury,
who are to give receipts for the same, and to
report to the Commissioners on public ac-
counts, on or before the tenth day of Novem-
ber next, the amount by them respective-
ly received; and also to the Legislature, at
their meeting in November next, and that
all special Indents not rendered into the
Treasury as above, on or before the first day
of November next, shall be, and the same
are hereby barred.

Resolved, That public notice of this resolu-
tion be given in the several Gazettes in this
State, once every three weeks, until the first
day of November next. And that the Dele-
gates of this State in the Congress of the Uni-
ted States, be requested to cause this resolu-
tion to be published in one or more papers
in the cities of Philadelphia and New-York,
and that provision will be made for the ex-
penses attending such publication.

New-Jersey, have appointed the following
persons to superintend and direct the draw-
ing of the same, viz. Nicholas Low, Rufus

Richard Harrison, Abijah Hammond, and
Cornelius Ray, of the city of New-York—
Thomas Willing, Joseph Ball, Matthew Mc-
Connell and Andrew Bayard, of the city of
Philadelphia—His Excellency Richard How-
ell, Esq. Elias Boudinot, General El as Day-
ton, James Parker, John Bayard, Doctor
Lewis Dohm, Samuel W. Stockton, Joshua
M. Wallace, Joseph Bloomfield, and Eliza-
beth Boudinot, of New-Jersey, who offer the
following Scheme of a Lottery, and pledge
themselves to the public, that they will take
every assurance and precaution in their power
