RAILBOAD DANGERS.—For the last twenty years, or perhaps since the system of Railroads has been established in this country, there have, in all probability, been losses by ac ident to the extent of twenty millions of collairs. These have been clear, absolute losses to the community—as much so as property destroyed by fire or suck in the cesan. But these dissisters have been of a peculiar character, and, in the main, not those of fire or flood; they have arisen from the ordinar; conditions of archirect tain in progress; they have been caused by the loherent momentum that is a necessary property of great masses of matter in motion.

A Railroad Train is exposed to peculiar danger from this cause. Its track of from and level grade are bith made for the purpose of allowing its free progress, and the very ease and freedom of motion aggravate the danger of momentum.

Railread is interded as a means of rapid tran-it for persons and property, and the component parts of a loop motive and ears for travel on rails rapidly, are made necessarily heavy and strong—if otherwise, they would soon shake to pieces. It follows, then, that weight, ease of motion friedom from obstruction, and rapid transit, sil conduce powerfully to create momen tum. From accreate calculations it is found that the effective momentation of a train of six cars and aw'engine is equal to a force of 700 tons. The truth of this statement is painfully self-evident at a sudden only indo or obstruction. This FRARKUL DANGER WHICH IS EVER-PRESENT to a train is only partially recognized by Railroad officials. It is, however, un'erstood to come extent, and each car is provided with brakes, or blooks, arranged to press against the wheels by the action of the brakeman. This plan works very well for the unual stoppages of a train, when sufficient incitic is given to the brakeman by the engineer; but for those cases of danger which have arisen, and will arise, in spite of the most rigid scrutiny, it is notoclously inefficient, as all experience proves.

It is of no use for an officer to say that nothing can happen to your "train". There is not a moment that a train is in motion but that its exposed to dangers which a perfect control would prevent, and there should not be an instant of time in which a train is running, but that the facilities should be at hand for an instant, simultaneous and powerful application of the retarding appliances of every car.
