III. That, as all public offices are created for, they must be subordinated to, the public good; and official patronage should not be used for partisan purposes, or to promote the private advantage of those who bestow it.

IV. That every candidate for office must rely on his individual merits and capacity for his election by the people; and efforts to gain support from any quarter by bribes, bargains, favors, or promises of favors of any description, must be regarded as evidence of dishonesty and corruption, which unfits and disqualities him for any position of public trust.

We respectfully submit the proceedings of the Convention to our fellow-citizens, for ratification at the pells.
