In the next place, he considered the necessity for sucha movement. We had, he said, in our city six hundred thousand persons, and two hundred and forty-seven churches. Admitting the latter to average an attendance of eight hundred each-which was much above the mark -there would still be found four hundred thousand persons in Philadelphia unprovided with church accommo-dations. There was hence a great work to do, and the Dext question he wished to consider was, who is to do it? Was it the municipal authorities? No, it was upon the Church that this responsibility rested. One great inducement to engage in this work, and which he held to be perfectly legitimate, was denominational pride. The fact might not be generally known, but that did not alter it, that, relatively, the Methodist Church was losing ground in this city-i. e., its ratio of increase was much less than that of some other denominations. He held, therefore, that it was their duty to spring to every Facant spot and occupy it without delay.

The collection was then taken, and was in keeping with the characteristic liberality of this large and lourishing congregation.
