FNOW BIRDS.—A correspondent writes es so folows: There is a pleasant paragraph "going the rounds" of the newspapers, setting forth the manner in which an aged couple at Bothel Hill, Maine, yearly one tertained a number of snow birds, (Fringilla hymalis, Bonap.) which brings to mind some experience and experiments had with these birds in our city.

Some years ago I owned a property, having a large garden attached, which was bounded by a statle, the gable end of which, facing the east, was entirely and thickly covered with tyr. A portion of the grass plot was kept free of snow, and upon this spot the snow birds were supplied with abundance of food, which we strewed there every day for their use.
