ionists, declared: "I have over and over again been in the War Office, and urged upon the Department to stop recruiting in every part of the country. We have had the promise that it should be done; yet every day, in different parts of the country, we have accounts of men being raised and brought forth to fill up the ranks of regiments. The papers tell us that in Tennessee and other parts of the country where our armies move we are filling up the ranks of the army. I believe we have to day one hundred and fifty thousand more men under pay of the Government than we need or can we'l use. I have no doubt of it, and I hink it ought to be checked."—Congressional Globe, March 26, 1852.
