The Passion of our Lord, according to St. Matthew, will be sung at the Mass. On Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday afternoons the office of Tenebræ-a series of lamentations, lessons and psalms, representing the obse-unies of the Redeemer—will be sung and recited. On Holy Thursday will be commemorated that Sa-ored Supper during which the blessed Eucharis was instituted, and the true sacrifice celebrated Rt. Rev. Bishop Wood will consecrate on this day the holy oils which are used in the administration of the sacraments. A large number of the priest of the diocese are always present to participate in this ceremony. Another feature of this day is the procession of the Hiessed Sacrament, and the decoration of an altar set apart for the preservation of the restriction of the faithful. The grand altar is divested of every ornament, and laid bare is divested of every ornament, and laid bare for the solemnities of Good Friday. On Good Friday is commemorated the great sacrifice of the Cross. All the ceremonies of this day are of the most solemn and impressive character. Thousands flock to the churches to kiss the feet of the crucifix presented for their veneration. On

this day the Passion of our Lord according to St. John is sung; in the evening a sermon on the Passion will be delivered. The office of Holy Saturday is consecrated to the memory of our Lord's burial, and the Mass refers to his glorious resurrection. On Easter Sunday we have one of the most grand and solemn festivals of the Catholic Church, for on that day she casts off all signs of sadness, and gives herself up to emotions of joy. The Right Rev. After the wounded, who arrived on the night of April lst, had been carefully attended to, a messenger called at the tent of Mrs. Husbands, requesting her presence and that of her husbands at Wardmaster Skillman's stockade. A soldier, who writes upon the subject, says: "It was my good fortune to be present when Mr. and Mrs. Husbands arrived, accompanied by Milonigan Annie, and were ushered into the presence of many soldiers, whose joyini faces betokened the interest they felt in the proceedings. The chapitain, in a neat and appropriate address, then, presented, on behalf of the soldiers, as a token of tratitude and esteem they entertained for Mrs. Husbands, a massive gold chain and pencil. Mrs. H. made a brief and modest reply in words and tone of voice that bespoke the kindness of her heart. The form for making up returns of income has been amended. The new one is much more elaborate and restroing. There seems to be but little chance of evasion under the new arrangement. There have been a few copies of the amended form received by the arsessors, but not enough for general distribution among tax payers.

Deductions are permitted as follows:

1. Exempt by law, \$600.

2. All national, State, and local taxes paid within the year (which includes the deduction of the income

3. Losses on sales of real estate purchased within the year.

4. Interest paid out or failing due within the year.

5. Amount actually paid for rent of homestead, store, or shop.
6 Insurance, repairs, fuel consumed in carrying on business. wages of employees, and interest on

U. S. Circuit Court-Judges Grier and IMPORTANT CASE ARISING UNDER THE INCOME Edmund Pennell vs. William Baker, collecter of Edmund Pennell vs. William Baker, collecter of internal revenue for the Seventh district of Pennsylvania.

This was an action to recover back a certain tax paid under protest. It seems that in the year 1835 the plaintiff purchased a tract of land of about eighty acres in the vicinity of Chester, Delaware county, for the sum of \$9.600. In 1833 he sold the same land for \$40,000. The difference between the amount paid and the amount received, after deducting the cost of permanent improvements, was assessed against him as gains, profits, or income for the year 1863. The annual and special income tax for that year upon these gains, profits, or income amounted to \$1,900. This sum was paid by plaintiff to the collector under protest, with notice that he would immediately bring an action to recover the same back. The case was tried yesterday, and under the instructions of the court, as to the law upon the facts as above stated, the jury rendered a verdict for the plaintiff or \$1,922.72, it being the amount claimed with interest. John C. Knox, Eq., for plaintiff; District Attorney Glipin for the defendant.
