Epiron :- Here I am snugly enscor red at the house of Mr. Gray, a mile or two above Trout Run, and within hearing of the murmer of Lycoming Creek--mine bost is one of the Old Settlers, and a true decendant of the mighty houter Nimrod. It is delightfol, after the fatigues and labor of the bont, to draw around the blazing fire, and listen to some of his thrilling incidents of other and far off days.

Around are the everlasting hills, assun ing all sorts of fantastic forms, and filling the mind of the beholder with feeli gs of admiration and awe. Here and there some peak throws its rugged form along the sky, while on its tops, and in the dim distance stands the tall pine as a faithful sentinel over the

charming scene. Our little party consists of three persons. all ardest lovers of the bunt and accustomed to its toils and fatigues. As good luck would have it, we had hardly been seated in our new quarters when the starts ling announcement was given of the close proximity of a Bear. His lordship had been feasting rather abundantly from a choice lot of sheep near a neighboring cottage. An invitation was kindly offered us to join the pursuit, and you can well in agine how eagerly accepted. A loud whistle soon gathered round us a dozen or more of dogs and off we started for the hills. It was not long before Bruin was roused from his lair and the quick sharp backing of the dogs told us the course of flight the game had taken. We followed on-hill after hill was

passed, and quickly left behind. Now and then a wounded dog came hopping back, to crouch trembling at our feet, and then bring up the rear. At length the backing became nearer and more distinct, and we harried torward expecting to find the game treed .-But not so, for on rounding a certain point we saw the Bear scated on his hind legs, at a distance of a few hundred varies from us. The dogs had pressed him too close, and he was compelled to turn and battle for his life. He had just taken in his arms a favorite dog-s half bound and half seiter. The poor fellow seemed to know the perit of his condition, for he howled most piteously and turned his eyes toward us, as if from thence alone relief could come. He was not mistaken; for even then the pnerting bullet was on its way, while the sharp crack of the rifle sent its echo down the valley. They looked myste rious at such an hour, and seemed like im mease giants electring in the cold morningh I felt how bitter cold the air was without and began to think all hunters a set of fooland wished the deer a thousand miles away It is singular what a different view I took o things from that of the past evening, scated before a warm, cheerful tire-I was ponder ing in my mind what plea would best excase me from the days hunt-at least the early part of it-when my cogitations were abroptly ent short by my two companions. They took the matter in their own hands and settled it to suit themselves. I was very soon armed, equipped, and bounding cheerfully over the very hills on which a few moments before I looked with such horror.

I was much amused at a joke, one of our party planned at my expense. He shot a fine Fawn, and as it lay wounded on the ground lacked as if it had not been roused from he night's repose. Instead of passing a koife across the throat of his victim, my friend called loudly for me. His idea was to soap a cap from his own gun, and thus direet my attention a the spot; thinking of course I would not refuse so fine a shot. The tables, however, rather turned upon him, for before I came up the Deer had spring away on three legs, and in spite of all our after elforts, he escaped. The joke would have been a capital one had it proved successful. I have since thought that I might have fulmy game to camp and claimed it as my own

Perhaps I weary you, for I feel as if this letter was extended beyond a proper length.
