Northumberland, three hundred dollars; also due to the State five hundred and eighty-eight dollars, and twenty-
three cents; balance on State tax, one thousand five hundred and sixty-nine dollars, and fifty-four cents outstanding mil-
lita fines; also county orders yet outstanding to the amount of two thousand two hundred and eighty-nine dollars and
sixty-seven and a half cents, making the liabilities of the county amount to nine thousand seven hundred and fifty-eight
dollars, thirty-four and a half cents. There is due from collectors of county tax seven thousand one hundred and thirty-
eight dollars and sixty-three cents, and from collectors of State tax five thousand nine hundred and forty dollars and
seventy-eight cents; and one thousand five hundred and sixty-nine dollars and fifty-four cents outstanding militia fines; also
fourty-seven dollars and twenty-five cents court fines, and one hundred and forty dollars pay fund; also a note held
against Thomas Avel for \$27, in all amounting to \$14,930.50. After deducting the liabilities, the balance in favor
of the county will be \$8,191.76.
