The Prometheus brings \$30,000 in gold on freight, and about \$500,000 in hands of passengers.

The Commissioners proceeded at once to Costa Rica and Nicaragua, for the purpose of making a permanent settlement of the boundary. A large party of American ladies and gentlemen at Greytown, together with the Mayor and authorities, judges and other functionaries, met and celebrated the independence of San Juan del Norte: B. Osborn, Esq., of New York, pressided, and speeches were made on the ladependence of San Juan del Norte. The Governments of the United States and Great B-stain, and the Commissions were severally toasted.
