ARRIVAL OF THE

GEORGIA.

NEW YORK, Nov 28. The steamship Georgia, with the mails from San Francisco to the 1st inst., and two millions and a half of gold, arrived here to-

Her news from California is to the 1st inst., but has been anticipated by the Prometheus.

The actual amount of gold brought by the Georgia sums up \$2,742'000. She also brings 190 passengers, among whom are Senators Gwinn and McCorkle, on their way to Washington.

The total on freight is \$2,412,000, and at least \$300,000 additional is in the hands of passengers.

The Georgia brings St. Domingo dates to 5th October. The fever is reported to be prevailing to an alarming extent, and considerable suffering existed among the shipping.

The brig Four Brothers, of Philadelphia was wrecked on the coast, about the 10th of October, and Captain Soule, and mate and four men have since died, leaving only one survivor of the crew ; and he is sick.

THE CLEVELAND AND ERIE RAIL ROAD .-The Cleveland papers are filled with the celebration of the opening of the Cleveland and Erie, a road very important to the interests of New York City, and connected with the Erie and New York Rail Road. The length of the road is ninety-five miles .-The line is straight nearly the whole distance, and there is not a single deep cut on the whole route. The road is said to be substantially built. It crosses a number of bridges, the principal of which are those at Painesville and Ashtabula. The former is 82 feet high, and the latter 55. The bridges in Pennsylvania are Stone's plan, lattice trestle, with through iron bolts. The bridge at Crooked Creek is 800 feet long, 60 feet high, and cost \$31,000. Over Elk Creek, 1300 feet long, 116 high, and cost \$75,000. The main bridge at Walnut Creek, 1000 feet long, and 104 feet high. The cost of the road, equipped, is about \$20,000 per mile.
