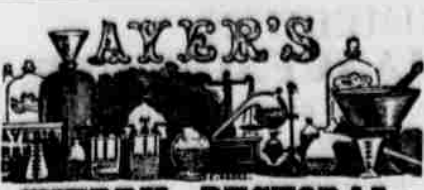


A STRING OF ITEMS.
